
Heroes of the Faith

Word from the Board

As I reflected on our Winter newsletter theme of "Heroes," you might think I would name Elisabeth as a hero—but I know full well she would have abhorred the thought of being considered as such! No, she would have told me to keep my eyes focused solely on God, not a human as flawed and frail as she was. She may not have seen herself as a hero, but she continues to be for many—including me—both an influencer and an inspiration. She lived with a single purpose: to glorify God alone.

I remember the last sweet days I spent with Elisabeth. She and Lars had come to stay with my husband and I in Charleston, SC for the week. It was mid-February, 2015, and flowers were beginning to bud in the warmer Southern climate. Elisabeth was physically weak and wheelchair bound, and she needed to be spoon-fed by her two precious caregivers who tended to her every need. She often appeared unaware, yet I am convinced she was taking it all in. She was just unable to clearly express herself. Though her aging body was nearly spent, the power of the Holy Spirit within her remained palpable. Her example to me in

those days was precious, and continues to bring me comfort today as I know that in whatever state we find our weak earthly bodies, the Holy Spirit will never leave us nor forsake us. (Ephesians 1:13-14)

The weather had warmed up one day during that final visit, and we decided to take a walk in some lovely gardens nearby. Elisabeth loved the beauty of the outdoors, and brisk walks in any climate were always on her agenda when she had been fit and able. On our way to the garden path, I noticed a woman watching us wheel Elisabeth toward the walkway. The woman asked if the woman in the wheelchair was my mother. I answered, "No, she's just a very dear friend."

I noticed the woman's British accent and asked where in England she was from. We chatted for a few moments, and I saw she continued to keep her eyes fixed on Elisabeth. I told her my treasured friend's name was Elisabeth Elliot.

The woman began to weep. She walked over to Elisabeth's wheelchair, bent down on one knee, looked into Elisabeth's eyes through her tears and said, "You will never know how deeply you have influenced my faith and life, and what an honor it is to meet you!"

Elisabeth's example of willing, humble service to God continues to inspire and challenge me, and prompt me to ask each one of us reading this newsletter to consider the kind of legacy of faithful service to God we are creating in our own lives here and now. Even when we are at our weakest, our testimony of faith can shine brightly—just as it did eight years ago on that garden path with Elisabeth.
